## Additional Notes on Medals in Mowbray Numismatic Auction 31, 22 September 2023

These notes include additional information from research by Mowbrays on named medals included in the auction. Not all medals are covered where no significant additional information is readily available such as for many medals awarded to Indian natives for action in the British Indian Army.

Many of the medals are accompanied by Vendor printed notes and research, some voluminous, and with the medals but only briefly summarized here.

Medal	New Zealand Medal 1860 - 1861
Recipient	LIEUT. S.M. MEDLEY, H.M.S IRIS
Biographical notes	Spencer Mansel Medley was born in Truro, Dorset on January 26th, 1837. Son of John Medley, Bishop Metropolitan of Canada. He served 32 years in the Royal Navy and served in New Zealand aboard Her Majesty's ships and in the Naval Brigade during the Taranaki War – landing in New Zealand in 1860  Medley served as a commander of coastguard for nine years in the UK and oversaw two batteries of Naval reserves for five years. He also captained a Naval Reserve Drill ship for a year and during the Taranaki war was in command of the Colonial Government's Schooner, the <i>Caroline</i> . He was appointed to the HMS <i>Iris</i> on the 19 <sup>th of</sup> May 1859. Medley also served in the Baltic aboard the HMS <i>Brisk</i> .  During the Waikato War, Medley served as a private secretary to Sir George Grey. He was awarded the Crimea, Baltic, & New Zealand medals. His New Zealand medal was awarded for his action at Puketakauere. He obtained the rank of Commander on the 29 <sup>th</sup> of December 1871 and retired from service in 1883 after obtaining the rank of Captain. After returning to England, he eventually settled in New Zealand and was an aide-de-camp to Sir William Jervois while he was Governor.  Medley married Mary Catherine Taylor in 1863 and had two daughters before passing away on the 28 <sup>th</sup> of January 1893. He is buried in Karori Cemetery next to Mary and his daughter, Adela.

Recipient	123. EDMD. MARTINDALE. 1ST BN. 12TH FOOT.
Biographical notes	Edmund (also called Edward) Martindale was born at Salford, England. He enlisted with the 12 <sup>th</sup> Foot on 5 Oct 1858. He was discharged in England by completion of service on 11 Jan 1869, at which time he was a Sergeant.  He was subject to disciplinary action in Sydney on 12 Aug 1863 and at Otahuhu on 12 Oct 1863.

Recipient	ALEXANDER STRACHAN. ALEXANDRA CAVALRY (Father of Laurie Strachan below)
	Alexander Strachan was born in 1846 at Comrie, Perthshire, Scotland, the son of David Strachan and his wife, Elizabeth nee McLaren. The family migrated to New Zealand in 1851 and settled at Lornty in 1852.  He joined the Alexandra Cavalry in Aug 1864. In his medal claim he stated that he was under fire at the first engagement at Nukumaru (24-25 Jan 1865), Otautu, near Patea, and at
	Kakaramea. This was supported by Captain Wm Newland who led the unit who in his affidavid stated:
Biographical notes	"I know that he was at the fights at Nukumaru, at Otautu and at Kakaramea. I was presnet at these fights and I saw Stachan in these fights. The whole column was actually under fire and therefore Strachan was actually under fire. I cannot say that I saw him firing but I can say positively that he must have been under fire during these engagements. The Maoris were firing very fast and bullets were flying all around us."  His claim for the medal stated that he had been under fire "upwards of 20 times".
	He also served in the Commissariat Transport Company in 1865. He also claimed that in 1868 he served under Major von Tempsky.
	From 1865 he was in the Scouts and he participated at Waikiwi, Nukumaru (24-5 Jan 1865) and Waitotara (11 Jan 1865)
	He married Christina Clark in 1882 and they had seven children including William Laurie Strachan who was killed in action in Egypt in 1917. Alexander spent his life as a farmer at Lornty. He died at Wellington in 1928.

Hard copy includes extensive documentation of the medal claim, including a report to the Minister of Defence of the investigation, the Solicitor-General's opinion on the claim, and the supporting documentation including the sworn evidence from Captain Newlands. The claim had strong support from former army colleagues and his local MP.

Recipient	SA: 3271 WW1: 42175 CPL.J.O'NEILL. N.Z.E.F. WW2: Unnamed - Lieut (Temp)
Biographical notes	James O'Neill (spelt O'Neil in the SA records) was born in 1881 at Pukerimu, Cambridge, the son of William Francis O'Neill and his wife Mary nee Campbell.  On 17 Dec 1900 he enlisted with the 6th contingent for the Boer War (service no 3271). He stated he was a labourer on his enlistment form, and that he had been drafted from the No.3. Waikato Mounted Rifles which he had belonged to for 3 years and reached the rank of Sergeant. For this service he received the Queen's South Africa Medal with Transvaal, Orange Free State and Cape Colony clasps and 1901 and 1902 clasps.  On 3 Jan 1917 he also enlisted as a private with the 1st Brigade of the Auckland Infantry Regiment, and he proceeded overseas on 2 April 1917. At the time of enlistment he described his occupation as Bushman. He was promoted to L/Cpl on 20 April 1918 and to Cpl on 1 June 1918. He received a gunshot wound to his thigh in France on 3 Oct 1918 and, while he recovered, he was transferred to England for the balance of the war. He was discharged on 2 March 1919.  He then joined the Volunteers at the No 4 Cambridge Battalion and served in the home guard. He resigned his commission of Lieu (Temp) on 25 July 1942. It is for this service that he received the WW2 NZ Service Medal. He married Kathleen Pearl Carthy in 1927 and he died at Thames in 1973.

Recipient	Major Justin McCarthy Power
	A large volume of hard & soft copy research confirms the awards.  Power (1892-1962) gave varying ages but was born in Paeroa, Ohenimuri County, New Zealand to a hotel keeper. In 1911 as a Railway Clerk he joined the Territorial Battalion of Railway Engineers, the prelude to an exceptionally long & diverse military career in services & support. He joined the Samoan Advance party on 12 August 1914, on 3 August 1915 reenlisted & was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant. By 10 November 1915 he served in France reaching Captain by 30 September 1915.
Biographical notes	He continued to serve in Territorial units in New Zealand after WWI. From a position as Secretary/Organiser for the Wellington branch of the National Party in 1939 he enlisted again, becoming a Captain in the NZ Army Service Corps. He served in Greece, Crete, Palestine & Syria earning an MID in 1941. Despite being retired in 1943 as medically unfit, he moved to Britain & was appointed to No 28 Group Pioneer Corps, then posted to Ceylon, Burma & Sumatra over 1944-46, working also in Berlin after WWII, finally being posted to Korea in 1953 & retiring in 1955.
	from his wife and his military records contain much discussion of payments made to her to support his family.

	Sergeant Laurie Strachan was born at Waverley NZ on 12 October 1886, son of Alexander and Christina Strachan, also farmer. Strachan, like his father above who was awarded the New Zealand Medal, was a soldier and a farmer. He attested 15/8/1914, embarked 16/10/1914 and served in Gallipoli, Egypt and Palestine
Biographical notes	He was mentioned in dispatches twice including in the London Gazette 6 July 1914 for "gallant and distinguished conduct in the field and other services.", for action 28 June 1917, (List 59, Part II, 12/103) by Sir A Murray and by Murray on 18/3/17, List No 46 Part II, 33/239.
	He was killed in action on 14/11/17 and is buried in Ramleh Cemetery Israel. His DCM was awarded on 22/10/17 for action in Palestine in July 1917. List no 53 (Part II, 49/363.
	Distinguished Conduct Medal citation: "For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in rushing forward and bayonneting (sic) an enemy sniper who was inflicting casualties amongst our men. By his prompt and gallant action he greatly assisted in our advance."
	Fully documented in available written records with medals. Strachan won one of 5 DCM's awarded to the Wellington Mounted Rifles in WWI.

Biographical notes	Walter Wilson was born in Oamaru in 1889, the son of Alexander Wilson and Euphemia nee Walls. Prior to enlisting for service, he was a boilermaker in Wellington.  He enlisted on 14 June 1915 with the b Coy 7 <sup>th</sup> Reinforcements, Wellington Regiment (giving his date of birth as 1890) and he embarked for overseas on 9 Oct 1915. He served in Egypt in 1915-16, and the E.E.F. in 1916. He was wounded in action on 10 Sept 1916 but rejoined his unit on 14 Nov 1916. He was killed in action on 7 Jun 1917, the first day of battle at Messines, and he is buried at the Lindenhoek Chalet Military cemetery, Belgium.

	Julian Anthony Christophers was born on 1884 at Dunedin, the son of Anthony and Juliet Mary Christophers. He was educated in Invercargill, including attending the Southland Boys High School. In 1902 he was a wing three-quarters back for the Southland rugby team and he excelled at rowing.  He married Earle Featherston Bremer in Wellington in 1908 and they had one child, Juliet Christophers born in 1909.
Biographical notes	At the time he enlisted he was a manager for Dalgetys in Wairoa, Hawkes Bay. He also had served as a Sergeant in the Volunteers.
	He enlisted with the 25 <sup>th</sup> reinforcements on 18 Dec 1916 and arrived overseas on 20 July 1917. He left for France on 5 Sept 1917, died of wounds received in action on 5 Dec 1917 and is commemorated at the Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery, Belgium.
	He was the third brother to die in the war, and a fourth died in France in 1918.

#### PVTE. J. A. CHRISTOPHERS.

The many friends of Mr and Mrs A. Christophers in this town, and the contemporaries of the fallen soldier among the younger generation, will learn with pro-found regret that Private Julian Anthony Christophers died of wounds on December 5th. The family of Mr and Mrs Christophers has a splendid war record. Of five sons four have joined the colours. The fifth reached military age just recently and was exempted from service by the Military Appeal Board on the ground of the family record, a decision of which it may safely be said that it was universally endorsed by the public. Of the four sons in the King's uniform three have fallen in battle, a sacrifice which few families have been called upon to make. Of the boys two were single. Trooper Victor was killed in action at Gallipoli in May, 1915. Herbert was also early in the fray, and though he fell in France in June, 1916, he had attained the rank of Captain, proving himself a fine soldier, a very capable officer and a leader whom his men were proud to follow. Julian, who has now given his life for his country, married some years ago Miss E. Brenner, of Wellington, whom he leaves a widow with one child. Though in the Second Division Julian found the call to service irresistible and went into camp over twelve months ago, sailing eventually with the 25th Reinforcements. Of the four sol-dier brothers there remains alive Second Lieutenant Reginald G. Christophers, who, though in one of the later classes of the Second Division, went into camp early in the year and has now almost completed his training. Reginald visited Invercargill at the end of last week to take farewell of his father and mother. Private Julian Christophers was born at Dunedin 33 years ago, but came to Invercargill as a child with his parents, Mr Christophers coming here to assume the management of the local branch of the Bank of New South Wales. He received his education at the Middle and Park Schools, and the Southland Boys' High School. After leaving school he joined Messrs Wright, Stephenson and Co., and in due course went to Wellington in the inter-ests of that firm. Later he accepted an appointment as manager for Messrs Dalgety and Co., at Wairoa, Hawke's Bay, and was in that position when he enlisted. Private Christophers developed early into a particularly fine specimen of vigorous man-hood. He was keenly devoted to rowing and football, in which his powerful physique stood him in good stead. In the Invercargill Rowing Club he had a record of almost unbroken success in maiden, junior and senior crews. In football he came rapidly to the front, playing first with the Pirates and then with the Invercargill Football Club. For two seasons he wore the marcon jersey in Southland's interprovincial teams, but an injury to his knee. received in the football field, put an end prematurely to his football career. By all who knew him his untimely death will be deeply regretted, and heartfelt sympathy will be felt for his parents.

The Tunnelling units were involved with extensive tunnelling in preparations for the Battle of Arras, the Spring Offensive, the Somme and Havrincourt. He also served in New Zealand during World War II as a 2nd Lieutenant.

Comments	Alan Joseph Gilroy was born in 1915, the son of Bernard and Elizabeth Gilroy. He was a shop assistant when he was called up for service.  He enlisted with the 21st Bn New Zealand Infantry on 14 March 1941 and he disembarked in Egypt on 19 Oct 1941. He was wounded on 21 July 1942, rejoined his battalion, was wounded in action again and died of wounds at El Alamein Egypt on 26 Oct 1942.  In addition to this cross he was entitled to the 1939-45 Star, Africa Star (8th Army clasp), War Medal, NZ War Service Medal

Biographical notes	Henry Reid Falloon was born at Masterton in 1922, the son of Arthur Henry Reid Falloon and Evelyn Margaret nee Elliott. He was educated at Wanganui Collegiate. He enlisted with the Royal New Zealand Air Force on 28 May 1942 and applied for flight service training. After initial training in Rotorua, he graduated from the Royal Canadian Airforce Air Observer School, Manitoba on 5 March 1943. He had extensive experience in raids in Germany and France, including Pathfinder missions. He was the navigator on a Lancaster bomber that took off at 2214 on 22 April 1944 from Little Staughton to bomb the railway yards. It was his 16th operational flight. His plane was intercepted by a night-fighter and exploded, crashing in flames at Dives (Oise) 20 km NNE of Compiegne. All the crew were lost. It was one of 9 planes out of the 181 in the raid that were lost. He is buried at the Roy New British Cemetery, Picardie, France. His brother James Elliott Falloon was also killed in action in Egypt in 1941.

Biographical notes	Desmond Keith Culpan was born in 1919, the son of Arthur Frederick Culpan and Fanny Frances nee Prichard.  He enlisted as a Gunner with the 1st Heavy Battery on 4 Sept 1939, at which time he was a battery specialist and motor mechanic in Auckland. He was discharged from the unit as 'undesirable' after repeated disciplinary offences, mainly being AWOL.  He re-enlisted with H.M.S Philomel on 28 Aug 1941, failing to reveal his previous service in his application. He was then attached to the Fleet Air Arm, Navy as part of the Royal New Zealand Naval Volunteer Reserve Force. He was killed in a flying accident 170 miles north of Haifa, Palestine on 24 Nov 1944, and is commemorated at the Beirut War Cemetery.  In addition to this, he was entitled to the 1939-45 Star, the Africa Star, Defence Medal, War Medal and NZ War Service Medal

## AUCKLANDER KILLED AIRCRAFT CRASH VICTIM

Sub-Lieutenant (A) Desmond Keith Culpan, aged 24, has been reported killed in an aircraft crash while on active service. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Culpan, of 32, Islington Street, Herne Bay.

Before enlisting Sub-Lieutenant Culpan was employed in the Star's publishing department. He left New

Zealand in August, 1941. Educated at the Marist Brothers' School, Vermont Street, and the Auckland Grammar School, he was a keen yachtsman and was a member of the crew of the B class keeler Tawhiri which sailed from Auckland to Nelson in 1939.

Sub-Lieutenant Culpan's younger brother, Flying-Officer Ivan Duke Culpan, is serving with the Royal Air Force in India.

Biographical notes	Raymond Charles Aley was born in 1909, the son of Albert Augustus Aley and Alice Maud nee Lawson. He married Lilian Nion Petit in 1935 and worked prior to enlisting as a customs clerk. He enlisted as a captain with the 2 <sup>nd</sup> Div Army Service Corp on 3 Oct 1940 and he embarked overseas 25 days later. On 19 Dec 1941 he was promoted to Major. He returned to Auckland on 12 Aug 1942 and on 3 Oct 1942 was made substantive Major. He then returned to the field.  He served in N Force, the NZASC 4 <sup>th</sup> Reserve Mechanical Transport Company and B Force, 8 <sup>th</sup> Brigade, NZ 3 <sup>rd</sup> Division.  He died on 16 July 1996.

He enlisted as a private with the 57/60 Australian Infantry Battalion on 4 Oct 1942. He was a shop assistant prior to enlisting. He mainly served in Bouganville. He was discharged on 5 Aug 1946.  After the war he worked as a survey assistant. He married Alma Rita Bennett in 1950 and died in Melbourne, Victoria in 1993.

Swann-Mason was also involved with the rescue of victims from the Luisiania, including burying at Queenstown a number of those who lost their lives. He ws also sent on a political mission to the Persian Gulf. In 1919 he was awarded an OBE (mil) for his work. He was demobilised on 20 March 1919.
	After the war he resumed his parish ministry as Vicar of Christs Church, Albany St, London and was chaplain from 1930 until his death at the Royal Horse Guards.
	He married Margaret Harriet Hart, second daughter of Sir Archibald Milman in 1907 and died aged 70 in 1942.

This unit used strange-looking tanks (known as Hobart's Funnies) that could be modified to float, clear mines, and carry and lay bridges and roadways, all of which proved their value in this action. Thornber was wounded in action on 9th June 1944 when that unit was fighting at Cambes, an important early action after D Day. He is a top rate Carpenter & Joiner & has carried out some excellent construction work." He died in Burnley in 1990.
