
Some of the medals are accompanied by Vendor printed notes and research, some voluminous, and with the medals but only briefly summarized here.

Alfred Pearn was born in New Plymouth in 1843, the son of Jonathan Pearn and Elizabeth nee Carter. He served with the Taranaki Volunteers as a Private from March 1860 until 1866. He was under fire at Waireka (28 Mar 1860), Mahoetahi (Nov 1860), Kaitake (24 March 1864), and Manutahi and Mattaitawa (Oct 1864). He married Mary Annie Richardson in 1873, worked as a carpenter in Inglewood, and died at Waitara in 1912.


The death occurred on Sunday in Waitara of Alfred Pearn, one of the old last-diminishing band who fought for their country on this T soil. He was the first whit shild born in New Plymouth, his porents having arrived in the "William Bryant." When the Maori troubles came on he was just reaching man's estate, and he saw four engagements, including Waireka. He was with the rescue party when tney brought the Gascoynes in. For these services he was awarded the N.Z. War Medal. Deceased had reached the age of 70 years. Latterly he had heen getting very frail (states the Mail), and death occurred through senile decay. The only daughter of the Rev. G. W. deceased married the Rev. G. Dent, Eltham. The funeral took place to-day, the interment taking place at Te Henut cemetery.

John Bennett was born in Wheel, Romford, Essex in about 1834. He enlisted with the navy in 1853, at which time he was a labourer. He transferred to the Royal Marine Artillery in 1855. He served in the Baltic Sea, 1854, China Sea 1857-58, and was present at the capture of Canton in Dec 1857, and New Zealand war, in 1863-64 taking part in various skirmishes. He was awarded the Baltic medal, China Medal with clasp Canton 1857, and New Zealand Medal. He was discharged from the Navy at the completion of his term of service in Feb 1874.

VETERAN OF MAORI WAR.

The death of Mr. John Rule, at his residence, Russell Street, Ponsonby, removes a colonist of 69 years standing, and also a veteran of the Maori War Mr. Rule, who was 81 years of age, arrived in Auckland in 1856. During the Maori War he served under the late Captain W. C. Daldy. Deceased was for some years a mine manager at Thames goldfields. For the last 50 years Mr. Rule followed the building trade in Australia and New Zealand. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity, and also an Oddfellow. Deceased is survived by his wife, three sons, one daughter, 16 grandchildren and three great-grandchildren

John Higgins was born in Glasgow, Scotland in 1836. He enlisted on 8 Aug 1864 with the 93rd Foot (service no 2834) then transferred after about two months to the 57th Foot (910) and finally transferred to the 72nd Foot (1518). During his early service he had six court martials for minor offences, and was in the regimental defaulters' book three times, but at discharge his service was described as "latterly good".

He served in Bulgaria and Crimea (2 years, 4 months), East Indies (6y, 10 m), New Zealand (2 y, 7 m) and a second term in the East Indies (4 y, 8 m). He was awarded the Crimea and Turkish War medal with clasps for Alma and Sebastopol, the New Zealand medal and the Medal for N.W. Frontier, India. He also had four good conduct badges.

He was discharged at the end of his term on 5 Sept 1876, with a partial pension because of being severely wounded by a gunshot wound to his left forearm at Alma.

William George Demerrey Washington was born in Kilbrogan, Cork, Ireland in 1836. He served as a Private in the 57th Foot (1/3/1854-5/5/1866), a total of 12 years 5 days. He was in Crimea (1yr 6mo) for which he received the Crimea Medal with Sebastopol clasp and where he received a slight wound during the attack on the Redan Battery on 18 June 1855; Malta (2 yr); Aden (1 yr 10 mths); East Indies (10 mths) New Zealand (5yr 2 mths) for which he received the New Zealand Medal; and the remainder at home. He also received 2 good conduct badges.

He arrived in NZ on the Star Queen ex Bombay 23/1/1861 and was discharged at Wanganui. He joined the Armed Constabulary in Moturoa 7/11/1868; Constable 2nd Division (12/10/1868-.23/1/1877). He married Margaret Jane Watson in 1881 and he died at Wanganui in 1900.


Albert Knowsley, (2/1/1879 - 1935) was born at Plymouth, England, the son of Edward and Fanny Knowsley.

He served with the Imperial Yeomanry and served in South Africa from 6 March 1900 to 4 March 1901. He was present at the battle on 29 Nov 1900 at Rhenoster Kop in northern Transvaal. At his own request he was discharged in Johannesburg, and he then married Agnes McIntosh there. He was reported to be suffering from rheumatism on his discharge.

He enlisted for WW1 on 13 Aug 1914, and served until 10 Oct 1916 when he was discharged as physically unfit for war service due to rheumatic fever contracted on war service. Prior to the war he was a Wellington City Tramways Storekeeper, and he was appointed a records clerk for the Engineers in Egypt (1914 and Oct 1915 - April 1916) and Gallipoli (April - Sept 1915). He was discharged and returned to New Zealand after suffering rheumatic fever.

He died in Masterton in 1935.

William Augustine (Gus) Ferry was born in Dunedin in 1888, the son of Augustine Ferry and his wife Sarah Ann Newrick. He was a jeweller in Kaikoura prior to enlisting.

He enlisted as a Trooper with the Canterbury Mounted Rifles on 19/09/1914 and served in the Egyptian theatre from 1914 to 1916. He was wounded in his right leg at Bauchop's Hill, Gallipoli on 9/08/1915 as part of the attack on Chunuk Bair. (Col Arthur Bauchop was mortally wounded on this hill one day before Ferry.)

He spent time in hospital in England before returning to active service as a signals officer on 11/01/1916. He was promoted to L/Cpl on 24/03/1916, but was invalided back to New Zealand on 11/06/1916 as no longer fit for active duty on account of wounds received in action. He is recorded as receiving the Gallipoli Medallion and Lapel Badge in 1967.

He married Alice West in New Zealand in 1916, and he returned to work as a watchmaker and jeweller in Kaikoura. He died at Kaikoura on 27/08/1980

James George Balfour was born in Edinburgh in 1896, the son of John M Balfour and Alison Margaret nee McKinlay. He enlisted with the 442 Agric Coy Labour Corp (385273) in 1914, but was discharged in Nov 1914 as unfit for service. He then enlisted with the Camerons on 13/09/1915 (S-20798). He transferred to the Labour Corps again on 3/11/1917. He ended the war as a T/Sgt with the Highland Light Infantry (75359). He served in France from 13/12/1915 to 22/05/1918 with the balance of his service in England. He has multiple minor disciplinary actions.

He was discharged as a L/Cpl on 25/01/1919.

He married Rebecca Jane Inster in Edinburgh in 1920. He migrated to New Zealand in the early 1930s and worked as a storeman. He was called up for WW2 service in April 1942. He died in Wellington in 1960.


He married Jemina Williamson Currie in 1918 and he died in Timaru in 1944.

Stanley Richard Harrington was born in New Zealand on 23rd March 1916, the son of John and Catherine nee Telfer. He was an employee for Kodak in Dunedin before his enlistment.

He left New Zealand on the 27th of August 1940 to land in Egypt. He was captured at the battle of

Crete and declared missing 21st June 1941. Notification that he had been taken as a POW at the Stalag VIII-B camp was sent to his next of kin on the 3rd of December 1941.

Harrington was declared safe on the 28^{th} of May 1945 and returned to New Zealand to be discharged on the 2^{nd} September 1946.

He died in Wellington in 2004.

(service no 47935) He was accidentally drowned on 25 Oct 1942 when swept from rocks by the sea while on leave, and is buried at Kingston cemetery, Norfolk Island.

He was employed as a laboratory assistant with the State Forest Service when he enlisted with the RNZAF on 6 June 1940.

He trained at Levin and then in Ontario, Canada and was 7/11/1941 he was commissioned to the rank of Pilot Officer. He then embarked to England and was in late Dec 1941 posted to India. On the 1st of October 1942 he was promoted to Flying Officer

His mother was born in Bavaria, Germany in 1880 and her family had migrated to Australia and been naturalised in 1884. They married in Australia in 1913 and migrated to Tai Tapu, Canterbury, where Thomas worked as a blacksmith.

A poultry farmer, James Ritchie enlisted on 7 Aug 1940 and served abroad from 27 June 1941. He was reported wounded in 1942, and then severely wounded on 1 April 1943. He arrived back in New Zealand in July 1943 and then underwent extensive plastic surgery. He died of his injuries on 4 July 1945.



He returned to Brisbane on 5 Sept 1942, and then was in Port Moresby, Sydney, and the Northern Territory. In total he served for 1106 days, of which 702 were outside of Australia. He was promoted to Corporal on 1 March 1945 and discharged on 24 Sept 1945.

Both before and after the war he worked as a labourer. He married Gwennie Doreen Moon in 1927 and died in Kogarah, New South Wales in 1979.



Frank J Galvin was born in Jersey City, New Jersey in 1919. He enlisted with the CO H 158th Infantry on 13 Sept 1940 (service no 20 233 949). He participated in the Luzon Southern Philippine campaign from 9 Jan 1945 – 15 Aug 1945. Around 8,310 American servicemen were killed in this campaign, which was part of General Douglas MacArthur's Philippines campaign from 20 Oct 1944-15 Aug 1945. 

Keeran Whelan (also spelt Kyran, Keyran, Koran and Kerian) was born in Laois, Ireland in 1832 or 33 (sources vary).

He was in the 6th and 59th Foot prior to serving in the 14th. In total he had 18¼ years of service of which 6 years 1 month was in New Zealand and 3 years 4 months in Australia. He was discharged on a pension in New Zealand and in 1866 he married Honora Holmes nee Vanney in Auckland. His wife died in 1888 leaving him with a family of small children.

He joined the Armed Constabulary in Taranaki and eventually was appoint a Police Sergeant in Patea. He remained in the Police force until 1898, retiring with a pension. He received a Long Service and Good Conduct medal from the Police force. He never remarried. He died in Wellington in 1908.
